- More than 60% of the country does not have access to basic health care services.
- Only 43% of Mozambique has access to safe water as opposed to 100% of Australia.
- Children are at risk of malaria, diarrhea and other vaccine preventable diseases.
- 90% of all malaria are in sub-Sahara Africa.
- 3000 children die each day from malaria
- At least 25 million people in Africa are HIV+.
